








In 1733, a group of about 60 Salzburgers began their journey in Augsburg, Germany. From Augsburg to Dover, England, where they boarded the *Purysburg (ship)* and set sail for Georgia.



The storm-tossed ship took 63 days to reach land. Unbelievably, the Purysburg made it to Savannah, Georgia on March 12, 1734, with 37 Salzburgers still alive; they then traveled several miles to the settlement. They called their new home Ebenezer, "stone of protection."

## "The story of the Georgia Salzburgers"

<sup>1</sup>Once upon a time there were some German-speaking people from a mountain valley in <u>Salzburg</u> who were driven from their homeland because they would <u>not</u> <u>change their religion</u> to suit the Roman Catholic Archbishop in Germany.



<sup>2</sup> At this same time, colonies were being set up by England across the sea in <u>Georgia</u>. In 1734, the first group of Salzburgers came from a place called <u>Berchtesgaden</u>. It was a long hard journey to the new

land.

<sup>3</sup> Oglethorpe and the people in the colony of Savannah helped these Salzburgers choose a spot to live on the <u>Savannah River</u>. They went right to work to build a town they called <u>"Ebenezer,"</u> which means <u>"Stone of Help."</u>

<sup>4</sup> They were hardw<u>orking</u>, <u>honest</u>, and <u>religious</u> people. Later more Salzburgers came to Ebenezer. It was a <u>very hard job</u> to start up a brand new

town. They farmed and built houses and other buildings that they needed.

<sup>5</sup> The most <u>special thing</u> they built was their <u>church</u> named <u>Jerusalem</u>. This church is still used by Salzburgers today. The people are still proud of their families and their <u>heritage</u>!
